The celebration of our 150th anniversary was a nugget of joy, with music, inspirational words from emeritus pastors, and a festive march through Berkeley. The retreat to Monte Toyon was fantastic; please consider joining us this year if you missed 2024. And throughout the year I am

sustained by our music program. I hope you each find or create an activity that brings you joy and brings you to church.

It has been an honor to serve as Moderator this past year. I'm continually impressed by the care and energy provided by our ministries and teams. And the stability offered by each member of staff is such a lifeline. "I'll take care of that," someone invariably says at just the right time. Thank you all for being a great team as we build this warm community.



Moderator Elect MARGARET KAVANAUGH-LYNCH



While serving as Moderator Elect I have enjoyed attending Church Council meetings and learning more about how our church is governed; as well as the roles of many members of the congregation as they work in the various subcommittees that serve our church. It impressed on me how many volunteers we have amongst us and how they are making real the commitment of being the "hands and feet" of God in our community. I am moved by their love, commitment and dedication.

I also attended, for the first time, the NCNC UCC Annual Gathering, held

It was wonderful to experience our larger family, first hand.

<u>Clerk</u> LAURA MONROE



The clerk of the church is responsible for keeping the records of church business and taking minutes at Council and Congregational meetings. Highlights from 2024 are summarized here.

In March, Council authorized the church to sell the Durant House property to EBALDC rather than leasing it. This is the next step in First Church's commitment to build affordable housing for families on the church property we are no longer using. Council also approved updates to the employee handbook to cover parental leave and approved a ministerial housing allowance for Rev. August Laperche, First Church's

Director of Operations. This allowance is available to ministerial staff in lieu of providing housing.

In April, Council ratified a revised personnel handbook.

In June, an addendum to the revised personnel handbook was accepted. This change honors pre-existing agreements for Lay Professional sabbatical leave and pension/retirement funds.

In September, Council held a special meeting with the Affordable Housing team to approve the parameters the team will use in negotiations with EBALDC. This is the next step in the sale of the Durant House property.

In the scheduled September Council meeting, Council agreed to join with other Berkeley nonprofit organizations in opposing city measure GG on the November ballot, which was ultimately rejected by Berkeley voters.

In December, Council voted to approve the proposed 2025 budget for First Church. As part of the motion, they authorized Council to establish a committee to review income and expenses in the operating budget. The goal is twofold: seeking areas where current financial adjustments are possible in 2025 and working to balance the budget going forward in 2026.

Ministries

Adult Education Ministry

Adult Education has a long history at First Church and the Adult Education Ministry is serving the congregation in upholding and organizing the continued learning in our church.

This year, Adult Education has continued the momentum built from the previous year. We have continued to offer many learning hours, partnering with various individuals and ministries in the congregation to offer a variety of programming that is timely and draws interest from the congregation. Care, Fellowship, & Invitation Ministry

The Ministry of Care, Fellowship, and Invitation (CF&I) seeks to provide a welcoming and inviting presence for all who cross the threshold of our church and to offer hospitality and care for the First Church Community and beyond.

Throughout 2024 CF&I members staffed welcome tables each Sunday greeting members and visitors, offering name tags, and answering questions. The ministry met virtually each month to address the upcoming needs and catch up with each other.

Along with the ongoing coordination of the After Party soup providers (thank you, Susan Greef), and Meal Train requests (thank you, Robin Kempster), this year our efforts included picking up and serving coffee and doughnuts for Easter Services, serving pie for the Juneteenth celebration, and offering mac and cheese to our Trunk or Treat visitors. We also

collected cookies for Cal students and served cookies after the Christmas Eve service, along with serving cake and ice cream for a variety of other celebrations.

For the first time we offered the opportunity to engage more members in our efforts with the option of serving as auxiliary members. This meant an email would be sent to this group when there was a need for extra help with a specific event. Auxiliary members were free not to attend our monthly meetings or serve regularly. This arrangement proved beneficial especially through the summer months and holidays. Most of those on the auxiliary list participated at least once and have agreed to continue as auxiliary members.

We look forward to continuing to contribute to making FCCB a warm and inviting place for all. As chair I greatly appreciate the members and staff who generously offered their time and positive energy.

Families, Children, & Youth Ministry

PAM VANDEKAMP, CHAIR



The Families, Children & Youth (FamChY) Ministry at First Church Berkeley envisions our ministry to be devoted to building fellowship and connection among families in our congregation, to supporting families in the challenges of raising children today, and to nurturing the faith formation of children, youth and parents/guardians. Throughout the past year, we have engaged each month in a reflective process related to the actualization of this vision in service to our children, youth and families.

Within our reflective conversations, we spent time building support for dedicated spaces to cherish and support the children, families and youth in our congregation. After establishing and staffing the Children's Space in 2023, which takes place every Sunday (with the exception of All Ages Sunday) we looked for ways to expand our outreach. This year, we spent time each month talking about the opportunity to provide dedicated trainers for Our Whole Lives (OWL) interactive workshops. Our Whole Lives (OWL) is a comprehensive, lifespan sexuality education curriculum for use in both secular settings and faith communities. Despite the limited physical space available, we are striving to offer this to our church children and youth and develop in house resources to provide this opportunity on an ongoing basis. We hope to offer this training for facilitators in our church in the Fall of 2025.

We also expanded the scope of care for our youngest members by hiring a Child Care Coordinator in the Fall of 2024. Sharonda Chappel joined us in December to attend to children 0-2 and is sharing the Pillar Room with the Children's Space during worship. Sharonda will be at church every Sunday ready to provide excellent care. Our prayer is that this will increase the number of families with young children who are interested in attending FCCB. In addition, the Amen Corner behind the pews in the sanctuary provides a small assortment of activities and items for anyone who might need a little support during the weekly worship service.

Our Children's Space and Childcare needs volunteers to assist each week to comply with our church policy that children are always supervised by at least two adults who have been screened and trained in best practices for child



supervision. In order to increase the number of volunteers in our Children's Space we held a LiveScan Party on November 3. We had eight volunteers who met to complete the LiveScan

form and went together to submit it to the DOJ. Many more requested the LiveScan form and have done this on their own. Next step is to complete the SafeChild online training and volunteer application our church requires.

FamChY also provided support for a number of events for children, families and youth including:

- Mardi Gras celebration with crafts and activities
- Egg Hunt on Easter Sunday
- Annual Summer Work Camp for our Youth
- Fall Festival activities and support
- Trunk or Treat in conjunction with All Soul's Day
- Advent Craft Fair with hot cider and cookies
- All-Ages Christmas Eve Service in which children and adults dressed up and reenacted the story of the birth of Jesus

We are also blessed with an ever expanding chorus of FamChY Angels, members who are not able to commit to being on the Ministry Team, but are always available to help with specific projects and events.

As our Ministry continues to prioritize building connection among families in our congregation we ask for your prayers and support.

Justice & Service Ministry

The Justice and Service (J&S) Ministry has the privilege of learning about nonprofit organizations and then deciding the orgs that will be the recipients of the weekly plate offering and the special offerings for Easter and Christmas. During this past year, J&S spent time discussing our stated criteria for decision making; we reviewed the list of priorities created by the 2017 FCCB survey and discussions held by previous J&S teams. We decided the current criteria and priorities will continue to be our guide for discernment. J&S and the recipient organizations are grateful for your generous support, First Church. Thank you!

Justice and Service organized two Service as Worship Sundays; one in January and one in August. We appreciate the dedication of other

ministries and FCCB members who are always willing to lead projects. Thank you, First Church, for donating an abundant amount of school supplies and money, so that **20 School Kits** (and extra supplies and \$81) could be provided to **Church World Service Northern California.** Thank you, Amare, Kathy, and Lucas for the support you provide by setting up all the extra tables and chairs.

J&S thanks you for your continued support of our unhoused neighbors and Berkeley/Albany residents experiencing food insecurity. In 2024, you have provided:

- **600 Bag Lunches** for the Second Sunday Sandwiches program led by Richard Brabham, with support from Judy Huston and Susan Greef. Thank you, Paul Kealoha-Blake for helping to distribute these lunches.
- **683 Boxes of Cereal** and **639 Jars of Peanut Butter** for the Berkeley Food Pantry with the dedication of Birtukan Beyenssa and Mary Fujii who weekly collect and deliver the items along with lots of egg cartons and brown bags
- **60 Christmas Love Notes with two \$10 gift cards from Target and Safeway** with help from W&SL. (\$1,380 was generously donated. The extra \$180 was given to the Women's Daytime Drop-in Center.)
- 72 Pairs of new, warm socks and lots of plastic bags for Trinity Center in Walnut Creek

Mental Health & Disability Ministry Team **REV. KELLY COLWELL, STAFF REPRESENTATIVE**

Led by a strong and collaborative leadership team comprised of Helen Walsh, Winnie Boyle, Charlotte Russell, Cindy Au, and Kathy Keller, the Mental Health and Disability Ministry Team continues to meet regularly to bring the congregation's awareness and focus to those with mental health and disability related needs both inside of our congregation and beyond. The team continued to meet by Zoom each month to support the congregation's commitment to being a Welcoming, Inclusive, Supportive, and Engaged (WISE) Congregation for Mental Health. Meetings served not only as space for planning and decision-making but also a space for deep sharing and mutual support among members.



This year, the team brought a truly intersectional lens to their work, attending to the ways that mental health and disability overlap with and contribute to poverty and food insecurity. The group took on leadership supporting Richard Brabham's efforts with the Second Sunday Sandwich program, as well as making

connections with the organization Consider the Homeless and the 63rd Street Community Garden. The in-person mental health spiritual support group continues to meet on the third Sunday of every month, facilitated by chaplain Cindy Au. The team continues to strengthen the library offerings and look for ways to raise the profile of mental health and disability inclusion in the congregation. The team looks forward to working in the coming year to support the congregation's ongoing learning and growth as a WISE congregation, and continuing to support the working group that is guiding the congregation towards gaining the *Accessible to All (A2A)* designation from the UCC Disability Ministries.





Annual Report 2024

Green Ministry Team

During 2024, the Green Team continued to offer environmental presentations, Green Tips, and Abundance Table offerings.

We held a tree planting event, offered a presentation on rooftop solar in California, met with our local Representative Buffy Wick and staff to help influence solar industry policy, wrote postcards for the Environmental Project, gave a presentation on the environmental stakes of the election, and upgraded one of our recycling bins (with plans to do more once we are in the new building).



On the 3rd Sundays of the month, Andy Young hosted the Abundance Table and offered plant seedlings, including milkweed and other native plants, to the congregation. Members also brought extra garden produce for giveaway.



We posted Green Tips each time the *Carillon* came out and included a range of different topics such as: electric vehicle affordability, environmental reading recommendations, sustainable seafood information, solar power policy updates, and breaking news on Climate Change. We also posted a survey asking church members to tell us what they would like more of from the Green Team (though got only a few responses).

The Green Team looks forward to 2025 and sharing new and important information as well as fun and hands-on activities, to the FCCB community.

Stewardship, Finance, & Administration Ministry



NICK KUKULAN, CHAIR

Major thanks go to Moe Wright, our treasurer, Sharlet Gilbert, bookkeeper, and August Laperche, director of operations, for working together to provide accurate and timely financial reports for SFA to review and track with the budget.

One major highlight for the SFA team was the July basement clean out over two Sundays. FCCB members and friends removed one truckload of paper for shredding, two City dumpsters of junk, two carloads of

e-waste, and multiple car loads of toxic waste material. Thanks to all who participated.

SFA members also led two Service as Worship Sundays with pew cleaning and tidying, and outside garden and parking lot clean up.

Stewardship

The members of SFA all took part in the annual commitment program; drafting the letter, participating in the telethon, giving testimonies, and following up with personal contacts.

2024 results:

155 pledge units, gave a total of \$554,116 with an average of \$3,575 per pledge unit (a pledge unit is usually made up of two members).

2025 results so far:

127 pledge units, giving a total of \$524,330, with an average of \$4,129 per unit.

Finance

2024 results in brief:

Income Sources cover what percent of total expenses?:

- *Sustained giving and all contributions 42%
- *Facilities Use Income –27%
- *Endowment Income and Draw 7.5%
- *other income interest- 2.75%

Expense Categories as % of total expense:

- *Personnel 70%
- *Ministry programs 5.7%
- *Administration 3.5%
- *Church Plant 16.5%
- *Budgeted Benevolences 4.3%

In 2024 our deficit is about 20% of total expenses. There are several accounting records that will be used to balance the books.

SFA recognizes and has presented to Council and the Congregation that a committee consisting of Molly, Kelly, Jennifer N., Moe W. Nick K. will start meeting regularly to figure out ways to reduce expenses in 2025 and to provide a balanced budget for 2026.

Administration

SFA looks after "Buildings and Grounds." Amare Gebreyesus does a great job of taking care of regular maintenance and some project work. Outside vendors are used for janitorial, gardening, electrical and plumbing repairs.

SFA manages endowment funds designated for projects on the campus. This year there were a few projects:

-To reduce PGE electric costs, SFA authorized replacement of Sanctuary and Hall of Entrance light bulbs to LED. This was accomplished this year.

- Our EBMUD water bill increased dramatically this year. A leak detection service gave a list of areas for repair. We spent around \$12k updating 14 toilets, 2 faucets, and repiping leaky galvanized pipes in the basement.

-SFA continues to investigate replacement of the aged and over-capacity gas boiler that heats the Sanctuary.

-Tower waterproofing is on the target list of concerns.

In October of 2024 the parking lot was brought under self management using the SpotHero app. This will enhance revenue.

Our core responsibilities include communion, setting up and taking down the Chancel on Sundays, providing welcome flowers for the children to hand out in church, serving at memorial services, and organizing monthly Operation Love Notes for our First Church folks who could use some encouragement and connection.

This year we partnered with the Justice & Service Ministry to

conduct two additional Operation Love Notes: one for Christmas notes to hold gift cards for our unhoused neighbors, and one to write notes of encouragement to Altadena UCC, which tragically burned down in the fires in Los Angeles. Deep gratitude to everyone who participated in any or all of the events – Love Notes are a beautiful and tangible way to share our love with folks in our congregation and in the wider community.

Two new Deacons this year brought additional energy and talent to the group: Linda Sawyer took on the heavy lifting of organizing and scheduling our communion celebrants and making sure we always have supplies, and Kate Lucchese – bless her! – spearheaded the audacious task of cleaning out the Bride's Closet. A devoted team spent two days (and more) organizing, cataloging, cleaning, laundering, and labeling a veritable mountain of worship-related sundries. We were grateful for the cheerful presence of little Andie, who kept us going with her giggles while mom Rev. Kelly helped out. The photo above captures the relief and joy of a few of us when our task was complete (the actual team was larger). A labor of love!

Prayer Team WILLEM VANDEKAMP, COORDINATOR



The Prayer Team at First Congregational Church of Berkeley is a team ministry within the Worship and Spiritual Life Ministry. Since the last four years we have been meeting every other Monday night, online via Zoom.

We receive prayer requests with concerns and prayers of thanksgiving from the congregation, mostly through the Sunday worship services, but also from our clergy and congregational care program manager and care team. Based on this information we maintain a running prayer list, which gets updated once a week, and guides us in our bi-weekly team meetings. The list is also used

by our church staff in their weekly meetings. Some of these prayers are shared with the congregation in The *Carillon* under "Tree of Life." The purpose of this is not only to share the joyful events and the various concerns with our church community, but also to involve the congregation in praying for each other.

The format of our meetings is: a check-in, a review of the list with new requests and updates, and a time of prayer with and for one another as a team.

We are really thankful that our ministry expanded in the past two years, and now has eight members. Unfortunately, Larana McVay had to end her participation due to health issues and moving out of state. We encourage the congregation to use the prayer request cards in the sanctuary pews and/or to share prayer requests online during the Sunday service.

We are thankful to God who invites us as followers of Jesus to pray with and for one another.


Committees

Blue Fire Committee LORENZO LLANILLO, COMMITTEE MEMBER



The Building sub-committee of Blue Fire Committee which consists of myself and Moe Wright has been focused on getting the building completed this year. The delays have been typical if you consider a normal course of building construction. Any alterations have been minimal, and once again due typical to constraints of what may happen in the course of a construction process such as adjusting materials to fit what was budgeted. Taizan Construction has done well with finishes. The detail work in the assembly space has been particularly impressive as they have enjoyed the craft of edge finishes. As you begin to occupy the space, look around and pay close attention to the fine work at the corners of the wood features. You will notice many of these fine touches as you begin to live in these spaces in the coming months and years.

The quality of the spaces too, are remarkable. Regardless of personal aesthetic preferences, Siegel and Strain have created spaces that are richly defined by the light that fills them. Functional spaces are playfully articulated with color and brightness to represent the joyful care of which our community is known for. The kitchen is nicely laid out to optimize triangulation of movement to make it comfortable to cook in and easy to meet in. The terrace is a great use of outdoor space and makes the footprint of the space feel much bigger. The building is in the exciting place where we can begin to project our life in the spaces and will be able to actually live in the spaces in the next couple of months.







Covenant & Discernment Committee ANN JENSEN, CHAIR



The Covenant & Discernment Committee is under the oversight of the Ministry of Worship & Spiritual Life. Our primary task is to support and oversee members who are seeking ordination in the United Church of Christ (UCC).

We encourage our members-in-discernment to participate in a wide variety of congregational experiences. We support them during their process of discernment as they seek ordination and their call to ministry. We currently have three members in various stages of the several-year long process: Emily Carduff, Hope Hilton, and Qaisul Takihunang.

First Church also forms and maintains three and four-way covenants with church members who are currently ordained ministers in the UCC and are called to positions other than parish

ministries. The partners in a three-way covenant are the ordained person, the local church, and the Bay Association of the UCC. Four-way covenants include a calling body, usually the person's employer. Molly Baskette, Kelly Colwell, and Hannah Turner are in a three-way covenant with us. Those continuing in a four-way covenant are: Cindy Au, Chaplain with Sutter Care, and Larry Titus, Chaplain at John Muir Hospital.

We plan to meet with all members in covenant with First Church at least once a year and we are looking at ways to increase their involvement/connection with our community and ways we can be more supportive of them in their respective ministries. We are also looking to build relationships with retired ministers and those not in covenant with us who are members of our congregation.

The Discernment and Call committee has been reinvigorated with several new and returning members: Ann Jensen, Chair, Jim Alnas-Benson, Kristina McNaught, & Sara Orem. Kelly Colwell continues as the clergy liaison and support.



Investment/Endowment Committee NICK KUKULAN, CHAIR



Thanks to the generous gifts of FCCB members over the years, we have endowment funds that provide support for our annual budget, maintenance of our church plant, and support of specific ministries to which endowment funds were specified. Gifts to the endowment are greatly appreciated and welcomed.

Our endowment investments continue with the United Church Funds. Our investment policy has not changed for the past years:

• To maintain an asset allocation of 65% in equity funds and 35% in bond funds. This provides diversification and stability through the ups and downs of markets

• To re-balance the funds to maintain this asset allocation on a monthly basis

• Invest in socially responsible principles established by the United Church Funds

FCCB has two endowment funds:

The General Endowment finished the year with a market value of \$3,398,619 a reduction of \$42,229 from \$3,440,849 12/31/2023.

The Housing Endowment ended the year with a value of \$738,340 an increase of \$66,435 or 9.89% from 12/31/2023. We do not draw dividends from this account.

So why did the General Endowment have a -1.23% decline compared to the Housing

Endowment?

For the years 2012-2022 we booked an endowment draw, but never took the funds from the UCF account. This was because FCCB had adequate cash, and this allowed the Endowment to grow. This year our Treasurer, Moe Wright, decided that it was time to bring our accounting records up to date and going forward to only book actual cash drawn from the Endowment account. To accomplish this, we drew a total of \$297,584 from the UCF Endowment account. This covered the 2012-2022 period, and the years 2023, 2024.

Personnel Committee

This past year has been a full one for the Personnel Committee. A big project was the multi-month revision of the 2015 FCCB Personnel Handbook. Capably guided by Kara Korbel-Chinula and Director of Operations August Laperche, the revision included many updates reflecting current laws and guidelines, a cost-conscious review of compensation and benefits with SFA, input from staff, and updated and inclusive wording. Council approved the final version in April. Jennifer Nixon and August Laperche attended an "HR Bootcamp" at which they learned of various laws and regulations relevant to churches. As a result, FCCB migrated a number of 1099 contractors to W-2 status, among other things.

The committee worked to help make the leaves of Rev. Kelly Colwell and August Laperche successful. Several temporary and permanent staff joined FCCB this year, including Frankie Maston,



Yosha Gottbrath, Frances Tinney, and Sharonda Chappel. Leah Walz left FCCB as of 1/3/25 and we are grateful for her many contributions as Event Coordinator. Bella Vavra has recently stepped down as Coordinator of Children's Involvement and handed over the reins to Frances Tinney; we are grateful for Bella's caring contributions. Sharonda Chappel is FCCB's new Childcare Aid--a new position. The team helped coordinate the 360-reviews for staff, and chair Jennifer Nixon led the reviews for co-senior ministers Rev. Kelly and Rev. Molly. Rev. Kelly kept the church's org chart updated. Jennifer worked with August to pull together the information required for the \$1M 2025 Personnel budget.

REV. MOLLY BASKETTE

What a year we have had, Beloved. Again!

Most significantly in the arc of our history, in June we celebrated our 150th year as a faith community in Berkeley. For a century and a half, we have sung, prayed, preached, worked for the good of our neighbors, built, scrapped, rebuilt, moved, built again, fought entropy and decline, found ourselves in seasons of sudden massive growth, lived and thrived.

We have persisted through natural disasters, wars and many other seasons easily as perilous as the one we face now, with climate-fuelled fires burning Los Angeles and a second Trump administration about to take office. We have endured. We have stoked hope, fought for justice, and tended to those most at risk. And so we do still.

In 2024 we enjoyed a full year of Rev. Kelly Colwell and I working together as co-senior ministers, a model that many other churches are thinking of emulating. Our new structure has brought a greater degree of tensile strength, creativity and sustainability to our community. Rev. Kelly, and indeed our whole staff team (paid and volunteer: Rev. Hannah, Rev. August, Louise, Derek, Amare, Kathy, Robin, Bella, Leah, Sharlet & Kathy) is as hardworking, capable, mature and kind as you can imagine. I feel deeply blessed to work with this amazing group of humans. In addition to working really well together, we are cross-trained and well-equipped to handle the varying absences (such as Kelly's maternity leave—welcome Andie! We love you! And my upcoming medical leaves for hip-replacement surgery).

While I'm calling out servant-leaders (there are frankly too many of you to name!), I specifically want to thank Nick Kukulan and Moe Wright. Nick has served as our chair of Stewardship, Finance & Administration for many years, and is stepping down as chair but staying on the ministry. Moe will continue to serve as our Treasurer this year in what may be his 30th (!) year in the role, but will train a new treasurer to take his place over the course of this year. Additionally, Moe continues to be involved in our post-fire rebuild in a very hands-on way that has spared us untold dollars and difficulties. We are extremely blessed to have been beneficiaries of Nick and Moe's self-sacrificing, calm and competent leadership for many years—a kind of leadership that does not seek accolades but quietly does what needs doing (including triaging a raw sewage leak under Durant House!). You are blessings, Nick and Moe! Early in 2024, 30 of us went on a Civil Rights Pilgrimage to Selma and Montgomery, AL led by member Brittany Walker Pettigrew. Our many hours of study and conversation beforehand, and the willingness of every participant to show up as their best selves, meant we enjoyed a profound and holy experience of spiritual growth and insight regarding the reality of systemic racism and injustice in our nation, devilish divides that persist and are on the rise again.

Our new community building is almost finished! We will hold a potluck in the still-raw great assembly after Annual Meeting on February 2, and a Love Feast Reunion/Prom in the finished

space on May 3. The building is just as we had hoped: inviting and warm, flexible, beautiful, light-filled, energy-efficient. It is hard to believe that 8 ½ years after the fire, we are finally about to be fully home, and operating at full capacity to do ministry in the East Bay! Oakland School for the Arts senior and church member Hana Walker Pettigrew is on deck to paint two beautiful murals for us this spring in the completed building: a redwood forest in the upstairs Music Room, and a South Berkeley flower garden in bloom in the downstairs lobby. Thank you to ALL of you who made this possible by giving so generously to the Build. Gather. Grow Capital Campaign! If you haven't yet completed your gift to the campaign, it is not too late, as we are still paying construction bills!



In addition to the planned Love Feast/Reunion, our 150th anniversary committee led us on a history walk to all of our previous sites around Berkeley, created an installation in the

sanctuary of First Church through the ages, and in April will present a staged reading of an original play by Kate Lucchese bringing to life our role in the transfer of Japanese-American citizens in Berkeley to the internment camps during WWII.

Our on-campus affordable housing project continues, albeit at a slower pace given the current (region-wide) inhospitable funding environment. But there have been positive new developments, including changes to zoning and political culture in Berkeley that will allow us to build up to 69 units of housing on our relatively small footprint. In the meantime, we are undertaking the audacious step to turn Durant House into emergency sanctuary housing for refugees and asylum seekers until it is time to demolish it (likely several years from now).

I continue to gather and host Berkeley All Faiths, a community of lay and clergy from a wide variety of faith communities. We meet for mutual support and prayer, and to have a strong unified voice for issues of moral concern in Berkeley. Early this year we'll have an audience with our new mayor, Adena Ishii, to build political power.

In May 2024 I finished my yearlong certificate program at CIIS in psychedelic-assisted therapy and research. Despite setbacks on the road toward legalization, psychedelic medicine shows robust promise as a treatment for depression, anxiety, addiction, PTSD and many more conditions, as well as an adjunct for spiritual growth and renewal. I have been enjoying both educating folks at church and throughout the mainline church about the benefits of psychedelics, and working on a *pro bono* basis for those who have already undertaken their own medicine journeys as they do "integration work" afterward.

As a neatnik, I'd be remiss if I didn't say that one of my personal highlights from this year was the Great Basement Cleanout of Summer 2024! We spent two Sundays hauling out all the stuff we had accumulated in our vast basement, selling, recycling, upcycling and trashing it. We are left with a tidy well-ventilated space that both our HVAC system and the Holy Spirit can move through for optimal circulation.

As we set our faces toward 2025 and more history-in-the-making, we are all wondering what to do & how to engage, as individuals and as a strong faith community. I want to share an excerpt from a sermon I preached in November, post-election.

"Beloved, a lot of us are still reeling from the election. We may be called upon to go along with massive injustice, to turn a blind eye, to pretend ignorance, and hate ourselves a little or a lot because of it. Or we may be called to resist human powers and principalities, to speak and shout for the voiceless; to heal, repair and transform the world. We may be called to be people of courage, or more realistically people of faintheartedness who have said their prayers and set their jaws, then sing and pray and act and SHINE.

I don't yet know what the coming reckoning looks like. Nobody quite does. But I have an inkling of what our faith will demand of us.

Number one: mutual aid. It's good that we already do this, and love to do it-because we're going to be asked to do it on a grander scale, for all kinds of people we don't know yet who don't have their basic needs met.

Number two: Engage in ethical noncompliance with unjust policies and laws, such as: pretending to go along and then doing the opposite. Getting into good mischief, making tiny chinks in the armor of the oppressive forces. Noncompliance with injustice will be different for each of us depending on the jobs we do and where we sit in society.

Number three: Sacrifice. This encompasses mutual aid and ethical noncompliance, both of which cost us something: money, time, reputation, respectability, safety. But the sacrifices we may be called on to make–TOGETHER, it's important to add, for there is strength and safety in numbers–may range beyond these first two calls. They may demand our lives.

This is all big talk, and I am definitely not as brave as I sound. But I know this: being here with you makes me a lot braver than I would be otherwise.

This week, our sesquicentennial anniversary committee put up around the sanctuary foam board posters documenting 150 years of our history, our values, our vision. What we *have* done.

Which makes me wonder: what *will* we do? How will our bicentennial anniversary committee remember us in 50 years? What stories will they tell? Just as we tell the complex story of what our congregation did to mitigate the harm to our Japanese-American neighbors when they were put into camps during World War 2, what stories will *they* tell? Will they be proud of us? Will they wish we had done more? Will *we* wish we had done more?



We have more wall space. Which is to say: we have a history, and we are a part of history being made right now. Where will we go from here?"

REV. DR. KELLY COLWELL

It's an honor to take a moment to look back at the year we've finished together and reflect a little bit about where I see us going in the coming years ahead for this phenomenal community of faith. The past year began in January with Becky Smith's funeral, which was a remarkable event celebrating a remarkable life cut short, full of love and tenderness. We welcomed new members in January as well, delighting in the people God is bringing through our doors. Our annual meeting last year was woven through the worship service for the first time in a few years, and it really helped us to frame the "business" of the church as part of our faith practice.



Ash Wednesday came early this year, and we offered ashes to many students and staff on the UC Berkeley campus and then to our own folks in the evening as well. It was sweet to have it coincide with Valentine's Day and to think about love and ashes together. And February also saw a big, beautiful group of Firsties head to Montgomery and Selma on pilgrimage, which you'll have read about in Rev. Molly's report. That pilgrimage was on behalf of the whole church and continues to bear fruit in our collective learning and reflecting. We also had a Spirituality and Learning retreat led by Christina Hutchins, attended by a robust and engaged group of Firsties thinking about our Christian vocation to ongoing learning and growth.

In Lent, we gathered with the worship theme of Hard Asks & Surprise Blessings, focusing on the big things that our faith asks of us and the surprises that we find in rising to those challenges. I've hit 200 recipients on the twice-daily prayers I text out in Lent and Advent, and people gathered for faith sharing groups and prayer during Lent as well. We marked Maundy Thursday as house churches again this year, gathering in eight locations to share a simple meal and wash each other's feet. We shared Good Friday with our neighbor UCC churches from Plymouth and City of Refuge to Orinda and the Good Table, hosted by Orinda again this year. On Holy Saturday we put our cloth labyrinth out one more time, hoping that "next year in Jerusalem" will be real for us and we can move to our own stone labyrinth in 2025. And Easter Sunday found us back up at Lawrence Hall of Science for sunrise and in our sanctuary for a beautiful and moving service thinking and praying about what resurrection looks like in our own lives. Easter coincided with Trans Day of Visibility last year (March 31) which was a beautiful overlap!

After Easter my wife Sheryl and I entered a personal countdown mode towards the Big Event of the arrival of our daughter Andrea Claire, who we call Andie. I spent much of April preparing for my parental leave, although we did find time to celebrate Earth Day and I had the honor to preach for the Annual Gathering for our siblings in the Disciples of Christ here in Northern California and Nevada Conference, extremely pregnant at that point. Then, for me, it was directly on to parental leave starting May 1, and Andie was born May 3. The congregation has my deep gratitude for the gift of four months for us to learn to be a family of three, and our

strong and resilient staff team handled the leave seamlessly, even as there was overlap in leave for August Laperche's medical leave August-October. I'm also grateful for all the meals and gifts that helped welcome this extremely well-loved baby into the world and into our community!

I returned from leave in September in time for our third annual Church D.I.Y. Triathlon, lovingly curated by Ann Naffziger and family. Sheryl and I split the Tri this year for childcare reasons but it was a delight to be among friends and to introduce Andie to the event, her debut at First Church! Andie began splitting her Sundays between First Church and the church where Sheryl was serving in ministry, the Congregational Church of San Mateo. At First Church, all Fall she spent Sundays with Jeanne Strauss, whose volunteer service taking care of Andie made returning to work so much less stressful for me. I'm so grateful for all the ways this church has cared for me and continues to care for us in this new season of life.

Many of us (70?) tried out a new and lovely retreat center for our All-Church Camp Retreat in September at Monte Toyon near Aptos, a beautiful setting amongst redwood trees that was also a little more walkable and a little more accessible for those with mobility challenges. We loved the bowl-shaped campfire/worship space and the great food (and very allergy-friendly!). We'll return there again in 2025 and look forward to more years to come enjoying each other's company and God's presence in the outdoors.

Our Fall Festival this year was well-attended and joy-filled, featuring a dunk-your-pastors event for the first time that was an absolute riot. I'm increasingly convinced that we need more opportunities to enjoy each other and laugh together, especially as politics and world events get more dire. Our bodies and our nervous systems especially really need those connecting events. We began a worship theme for the fall of Bad Kings, Drama Queens, and Divine Doings, taking a hard look at power through our scriptures as we wrestled with the coming election. Many of us traveled in the fall to swing states to canvass, knock doors, and support progressive candidates for office (at all levels, not just the presidency).

October saw us taking blessings to the dog park (under the capable leadership of Rev. Hannah and Deacon Rev. Arin Dahl) in celebration of St. Francis and the Blessing of the Animals--we also blessed photos of animals during church, which I found deeply moving. And a group of folks headed back to St. Dorothy's Rest retreat center for a second Silent Retreat led by Ann Naffziger and attended by Rev. Molly this year. We capped the month of October with our fourth Trunk or Treat event, attended by over 60 people, many of whom were first-time attendees! August came back from their medical leave in October, and we held another Telethon as we marched our way through the Season for Commitment again, asking each other to commit to funding this beloved community together.

November saw us hold another Election Night watch party, where the mood started out hopeful and ended with sorrow and resolve. It was the best use of those hours, though, to eat snacks and dance and alternate between the news coverage in Loper Chapel and the children's movies playing in the Pillar Room. You can't sink too deep into despair while Moana is playing, I think.

And we picked ourselves up the next day with a supportive campfire gathering, a singing circle, and a rousing Sunday worship where we promised each other we'd keep going together.

The mood of resolve took us through to December and our Advent theme of Star Stuff, where we held space for a longer and more expansive view of the cosmos and our place in it. We're all made of the same materials, from stars to sand to human beings, and it's good for us to right-size our sense of self-importance from time to time, even living in these crucial and dangerous times. We sang, we lit our Advent candles, we enjoyed basking in the light of our five new chancel Christmas trees. And at Christmas eve services, my own (giant seven-month-old) baby got to play the role of Baby Jesus. She slept through most of the 4pm family service, but stayed wide awake and engaged throughout the 9pm service, taking it all in. This year I can truly say that my heart is full, my cup runs over with blessings.

This year was my first full year serving in the capacity of co-senior minister alongside the incredible Molly Baskette, having been called into this role of greater leadership and responsibility in late 2023. Molly and I continue to build on the strong foundation of our working relationship, leaning on each other's strengths and calling each other to grow in helpful ways. I'm delighted to continue working with Rev. Hannah as she really starts to build momentum in her ministry with us in her third year. And in 2024 we really benefited from the strong and capable staff team we've built. Derek offered us glorious and stirring music, ably supported by Liz and Amar; August took on a lot of organizational work this year and helped us put strong systems in place for ourselves; Louise continued to hold infinite details together with grace; Amare kept our building in good order and our furniture where we need it to be, with help from Kathy So and others; Sharlet kept our finances on track and information where it needed to be; Leah managed the building rentals with grace and kindness towards our renters; Bella offered a beautiful space for our children to thrive on Sundays and has now handed that space off to Frances, supported by Sharonda, our new nursery care worker.

Being fully staffed by great people has made it possible for us to cover for each other during illnesses, parental leaves, and medical leaves without too much stress or strain. It's created space for us to dream and create new things, meet emerging needs from within our community and meet the emerging needs of the political and natural world. It has offered me the ability to continue teaching--during the past year, I taught a course on Ritual, Trauma, and Social Change, and another on our denomination's history, theology, and polity at Pacific School of Religion as well as a course on Faith Formation at Pacific Lutheran Theological Seminary. As we look ahead to what comes next, I'm grateful to be going into it strong and supported by this team.

I will echo Molly's report by ending with a sermon excerpt, preached the Sunday after the election:

"Who's to say what comes after this? It's not a rhetorical question. It's a question with an answer, and the answer is: we are. We are among the ones who'll determine what this all means. Our varied resistance will be what creates the thing that follows this crisis. It would have been that way regardless of the outcome of the election. And if I know anything, it's that

we're always called to resist the powers of this world, holding them accountable to the most vulnerable and the earth, sharing a vision of a world made new even as we live in the world as it is. Two things can be true at once: we're tired, overwhelmed, exhausted, scared. And we're going to be ready for what we're called to do in the days to come, equipped by the power of the Holy Spirit who will never leave us and drawn forward by our shared and sacred vision of God's kindom on earth."





Minister for Youth, Young Adults & Emerging Ministries REV. HANNAH TURNER



Hello Church! We did a lot in 2024 - hard to believe all we did together. I hope in reading this entire report you feel a sense of pride and hope. Pride in your church and hope for our future despite budget deficits, national political adversaries, and all the other things this life throws at us. We have a foundation in this community - over 150 years in fact - of great love, seeking justice, loving kindness, and practicing mercy.

Due to Rev. Kelly's parental leave, I was given the great honor of leading our Annual Queer Pulpit Takeover this past June for

Pride Month. We brought in our in-house queer and trans preachers, and welcomed several queer and trans musicians to our chancel. Other Ministries Affordable Housing Committee

KERA BARTLETT BINNS & SCOTT SPORTE, CO-CHAIRS

The Affordable Housing Committee has collaborated closely with our development partner, EBALDC, to plan and develop affordable housing on our campus.

In the spring, we launched a committee FAQ webpage and held an online congregational information session to update members and address questions and concerns about the project's vision and



progress. Additionally, we met with the Church Council to brief them on the project and secure authorization to negotiate with EBALDC on selling parcels of our property, rather than pursuing development through a ground lease.

The preliminary project concept envisions an approximately six-story building with 50–65 units of primarily two- and three-bedroom family apartments. The building would face Dana Street and include a newly planned play area for the East Bay School for Boys, as well as a driveway pass-through to the parking lot.

Looking ahead to 2025, we plan to begin negotiating the term sheet with EBALDC and providing input as needed to support their efforts in obtaining the required entitlements from the City. However, with last year's proposed regional housing bond withdrawn and the current political climate, the funding environment for affordable housing projects has become strained. These challenges may delay projects like ours across the region.

At the end of 2023, Carmelle and Kerrie invited FCCB members who were over 60 to attend an in-person or online focus group and/or fill out a survey to better understand what the members of this age cohort wanted from their church community. They wanted: opportunities to explore the meaning and purpose of their lives at this stage, to share their spiritual journeys with each other, to deepen their spiritual practices, and to learn more about aging and support each other with its challenges. Above all, they wanted to get to know each other and share their life stories.

A steering committee was formed, which led to the creation of the Over 60 Engagement Committee and the following programs, all of which have been well-received and attended by up to 40 members:

 \cdot *Cultivating Joy*, taught by Sara Orem, PhD. Offered both in-person and on Zoom, this class offered participants a 6-week opportunity to try out activities that might bring them joy.

Saturday Discussion Groups:

o A Three-Part Series: *The Last Chapter: What Does Life and the Sacred Look Like Now?* facilitated by Bob Stumpf.

o A Two-Part Series: *Encountering Change in a Changing World,* facilitated by Bob Stumpf, Holly Bash, and Craig Pratt.

o Part 1 of a Three-Part Series: *Visions of Aging*, facilitated by Judy Huston and Bob Stumpf.

Sunday Adult Education Programs, facilitated by the Over 60 Engagement Committee:

o *Our Experiences of Growing Older*: looking at myths about aging and internalized ageism and sharing personal experiences.

o Community Resources helpful to Over 60 members.

The Over 60 Engagement Committee has reached out to some 60 church members who have not attended church in a long time, sharing information by message and by phone about current activities at church, especially of Over 60 activities, in an effort to re-engage these members. They meet once a month for discussion and fellowship.

FCCB Over 60 also initiated restarting Taizé Services.







Progressive Christian Bible Study


We took a year hiatus this past fiscal year, but we look forward to recruiting new members, finding new organizations to fund, and continuing our much needed support of local non-profit support services.



Pacific School of Religion

First Church has had a strong relationship with Pacific School of Religion (PSR) throughout its history. Several PSR students and alumnx have served our community in a variety of ways, and several First Church members have served on PSR's Board of Trustees and various committees. We are grateful for this ongoing partnership!

This Fall, PSR welcomed its most racially diverse class in recent history, with approximately 70% of incoming students identifying as students of color.

In October, Kwaray, a bold and collaborative initiative by PSR to

reimagine theological education, went live. Kwaray is a community-based learning platform equipping rising faith leaders as they navigate an era of profound spiritual and cultural upheaval. Kwaray's mission is to unleash the potential of rising faith leaders as they discover their purpose and take action.

Other highlights from the year included PSR's Earl Lecture Series, which centered around the intersections of Disruptive AI, Christian Nationalism, and Democracy and included a screening of the film *Bad Faith* at the Elmwood Theater in Berkeley, and an online workshop series by the Center for LGBTQ+ and Gender Studies in Religion entitled "Queering the 2024 Vote," which was aimed at empowering LGBTQ+ individuals, allies, and communities to be voices and votes for positive change in our nation's urgent need for justice, hope, love, and compassion.

Financial Reports

Treasurer

From the Treasurer's point of view this year has been one of review and modification of the accounting methodology that the church has used. In addition, there has been the work of managing the capital for the improvements related to replacing Pilgrim Hall and of course budget planning and preparation. All in all, much progress has been made on all fronts.

The following is a little technical, but I feel it is necessary to document the changes made in our accounting this year. Since the 1990's the church budget along with income and expense reporting has been idiosyncratic. Our basic system is "cash" based. This means that a transaction is recorded when cash moves either into or out of our accounts. We don't report income when it is billed. We don't report

accounts receivable or payable. There was one big exception to this when it came to endowment accounting. Our rules call for an endowment "draw" of 5% to be used for intended purposes. Some of this draw is sent to us as cash from dividends and interest (this is about 2% of the draw), but the remainder must be requested and stocks or bonds sold to raise the funds. For many years, the books reflected the "cash" transaction (receipt of dividend and interest) as actual income, but accounted for the remainder of the draw as a liability against the value of each endowment. Every few years we would request some of the endowment stocks and bonds be sold and the money sent to us to use as specified, but this did not happen often. Keeping track of this liability is a time consuming, mistake-filled process and it does not harmonize with the rest of our accounting. By 2021 the liability on the books had accumulated to \$388,090.63. To adjust the liability, we transferred an adjusted amount from the appropriate endowment's stock and bond accounts into our checking account to put us back on a cash basis and in the future, we will transfer the cash during the year it is appropriated and not accumulate the liability. This cash infusion helped balance this year's (2024) budget and will help with next year as well.

On the capital improvement side, we spent \$3,973,650 on the Community Hall rebuilding. The total spent to date is \$9,002,433. We have already built most of the additional features that the Capital Campaign outlined and the total will come in at about \$11,000,000. It looks like we will be able to start using the building in late March.

The budget this year represents the continuation of a condition that started last year. In 2024 we voted for a deficit budget in anticipation that funding would be available once Durant House and a portion of our parking lot was sold to a developer for the construction of affordable housing. The sale has been deferred so other alternatives must be considered. This year we also adopted a deficit budget along with a recommendation from Council to work to reduce the deficit this year and eliminate it next year. As mentioned above, the remaining cash infusion

from the transfer from endowments will help this year. The details of the 2024 budget and actual results and the 2025 budget are included in this Annual Report in a table. The plan for this year's deficit is to use the remaining \$160,327 from the endowment transfer explained above and to borrow the balance from the Ministerial Housing Endowment.
